In 1602 and 1604 two collections of paradoxes, both entitled *Four Paradoxes*, authored by Thomas Scott, and Thomas and Dudley Digges, respectively, were published. Surprised by the collapse of socialism in Hungary in 1989, he journeyed in 1991 to the Soviet Union, which by the end of the year had unexpectedly dissolved. He then spent the next decade studying how the working class survived the catastrophic collapse of the Soviet economy. These essays, presented with a perspective that has benefited from time and rich experience, offer ethnographers a theory and a method for developing novel understandings of epochal change.

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
