A Comparison of the Bayesian and Frequentist Approaches to Estimation Aug 28 2021 The main theme of this monograph is "comparative statistical inference." While the topics covered have been carefully selected (they are, for example, restricted to problems of statistical estimation), my aim is to provide ideas and examples which will assist a statistician, or a statistical practitioner, in comparing the performance one can expect from using either Bayesian or classical (aka, frequentist) solutions in estimation problems.
