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Nineteenth-century French Realism focuses on metropolitan France, with Paris as its undisputed heart. Through Jennifer Yee's close reading of the great novelists of the French realist and naturalist canon - Balzac,

Flaubert, Zola, Maupassant - The Colonial Comedy reveals that the colonies play a role at a distance even in the most apparently metropolitan texts. In what Edward Said called 'geographical notations' of race and imperialism the presence of the colonies off-stage is apparent as imported objects, colonial merchandise, and individuals whose colonial experience is transformative. Indeed, the realist novel registers the presence of the emerging global world-system through networks of importation, financial speculation, and immigration as well as direct colonial violence and power structures. The literature of the century responds to the last decades of French slavery, and direct colonialism (notably in Algeria), but also economic imperialism and the extension of French influence elsewhere. Far from imperialist triumphalism, in the realist novel exotic objects are portrayed as fake or mass-produced for the growing bourgeois market, while economic imperialism is associated with fraud and manipulation. The deliberate contrast of colonialism and exoticism within the metropolitan novel, and ironic distancing of colonial narratives, reveal the realist mode to be capable of questioning its own epistemological basis. The Colonial Comedy argues for the existence in the nineteenth century of a Critical Orientalism characterized by critique of its own discursive foundations. Using the tools of literary analysis within a materialist approach, The Colonial Comedy opens up the domestic Paris-Provinces axis to signifying chains pointing towards the colonial space. historical studies of aspects of the history of Adamawa, the Fulani, the
Twareg, the Shuwa Arabs and the Koyam in pre-colonial times. There is
also a survey of the state of Fula language studies and the variety of Fula
literature; discussions of the changing nature of pastoralism and the
nomadic way of life in Cameroon, Senegal and Nigeria, including the
effects of drought. This book contributes to an area of study that is of
interest to linguists of all backgrounds. Typological in nature this volume
presents data analysis from the major language families of Africa as well
as Sino-Tibetan, Austronesian, Japanese, Indo-European, Siouan and
Penutian. The 16 contributors to the volume share a commitment to
examining the language phenomena pertaining to the volume's theme
with a fresh eye. While most of the papers make reference to existing
theoretical frameworks, each also makes a novel and sometimes
surprising contribution to the body of knowledge and theory concerning
motional, directional and locational predicates, complements,
morphology, adpositions and other phenomena. This collection of articles
suitably complements courses on comparative and diachronic linguistics,
semantics, syntax, typology, or field methods. Includes various parallel

violence against women and their legal situation as well as biodiversity

Griot Potters of the Folona reconstructs the past of a particular group of
West African women potters using evidence found in their artistry and
techniques. The potters of the Folona region of southeastern Mali serve a
diverse clientele and firing thousands of pots weekly during the height of
the dry season. Although they identify themselves as Mande, the unique
styles and types of objects the Folona women make, and more
importantly, the way they form and fire them, are fundamentally
different from Mande potters to the north and west. Through a brilliant
comparative analysis of pottery production methods across the region,
especially how the pots are formed and the way the techniques are
taught by mothers to daughters, Barbara Frank concludes that the
mothers of the potters of the Folona very likely came from the south and
east, marrying Mande griots (West African leatherworkers who are
better known as storytellers or musicians), as they made their way south
in search of clientele as early as the 14th or 15th century CE. While the
women may have nominally given up their mothers' identities through
marriage, over the generations the potters preserved their maternal
heritage through their technological style, passing this knowledge on to
their daughters, and thus transforming the very nature of what it means
to be a Mande griot. This is a story of resilience and the continuity of
cultural heritage in the hands of women. Founded in 1993, the African
Yearbook, now published under the auspices of the African Foundation
