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An old woman is awoken in the dead of night by knocks at her front door. After eleven weeks of bombing in the spring of 1999, the United States and NATO ultimately won the war in Kosovo. Serbian troops were forced to withdraw, enabling an international military and political presence to take charge in the region. But was this war inevitable or was it the product of failed western diplomacy prior to the conflict? And once it became necessary to use force, did NATO adopt a sound strategy to achieve its aims of stabilizing Kosovo? In this first in-depth study of the Kosovo crisis, Ivo Daalder and Michael O'Hanlon answer these and other questions about the causes, conduct, and consequences of the war. Based on interviews with many of the key participants, they conclude that notwithstanding important diplomatic mistakes before the conflict, it would have been difficult to avoid the Kosovo war. That being the case, U.S. and NATO conduct of the war left much to be desired. For more than four weeks, the Serbs succeeded where NATO failed, forcefully changing Kosovo's ethnic balance by forcing 1.5 million Albanians from their home and more than 800,000 from the country. Had they chosen to massacre more of their victims, NATO would have been powerless to stop them. In the end, NATO won the war by increasing the scope and intensity of bombing, making serious plans for a ground invasion, and moving diplomacy into full gear in order to convince Belgrade that this was a war Serbia would never win. The Kosovo crisis is a cautionary tale for those who believe force can be used easily and in limited increments to stop genocide, mass killing, and the forceful expulsion of entire populations. Daalder and O'Hanlon conclude that the crisis holds important diplomatic and military lessons that must be learned so that others in the future might avoid the mistakes that were made in this case. Terrorism has become part of our daily news diet. Hardly a day goes by without news of an assassination, political kidnapping, hijacking, or bombing somewhere in the

world. As such incidents of terrorism have increased in the past decade, the phenomenon of terrorism has become one of increasing concern to governments and of increasing interest to scholars. This paper reviews the World Bank's experience with community participation (CP) in a sample of its projects selected from three different sectors; urban housing, population, health and nutrition (PHN), and irrigation. The sample was chosen on a judgmental basis and consisted of forty projects which were known to have the potential for the use of CP or incorporated it in their strategies, and ten successful projects from the same sectors which did not make use of CP. The focus of the paper is on the approaches to participation employed by the first set of projects and the lessons to be learned from their experience. An analysis of the second set of projects sheds light on the reasons why community participation was neglected by them.

Kjo ishte hera e parë kur ndjeva dëshirën që drejtësia duhej të sjelljet në vend. Asnjëherë nuk kisha mundësi të ngrij zërin sa i përket kësaj periudhe dhe kjo temë diplome më mundësoi, po ashtu, të shpreh faktet dhe mendimet e mia sa i përket kësaj periudhe fatkeqe për popullin tim dhe popuj të tjerë të vuajtur. Ajo që vazhdoi të rritë dëshirën time për të vazhduar të punojë në këtë tezë ishin gjyqet e Nurembergut, të cilat filluan ndërmjet 20 nëntorit 1945 dhe 1 tetorit 1946, ku në këtë seri gjyqesh ata duhej të provonin 24 nga udhëheqësit më të rëndësishëm politik dhe ushtarak të Regjimi të Tretë duke përfshirë Adolf Hitlerin, i cili kishte vrarë veten para se të gjykohej. Pas gjykimit të Nurembergut dhe Tokios, ICC ka njohur Gjykatën Ndërkombëtare Penale e cila gjendet në Hagë në Holandë. U krijua njëzet vjet më parë si gjykata e parë e përhershme ndërkombëtare penale nga udhëheqësit e shteteve në të gjithë botën. Kjo strukturë e gjykatave përmban katër organe, Divizionet Gjyqësore, Zyren e Prokurorit, Presidencën dhe Regjistrin. Gjenerimi i dytë i gjykatave hibride krijoi ICTY (Tribunali Penal Ndërkombëtar për ish-Jugosllavinë) dhe ICTR (Tribunali Penal Ndërkombëtar për Ruandën). ICTY u krijua në 1993 nga Kombet e Bashkuara dhe ishte gjykata e parë që ndonjëherë u dha zë atyre që kishin përvoja të tmerrshme. Në këtë gjykatë shumë liderë shtetërorë u dyshuan në mënyrë menjëherëshme për krime masive dhe disa prej tyre madje u gjykuan. Nëse nuk do

formoheshin këto gjykata hibride, plot gra të dhunuara, fëmijë, burra nuk do të kishin gjetur paqe. Në atë kohë, përdhunimi ishte përdorur si një instrument terrorizmi ndaj këtyre njerëzve. Kryesisht qëllimet e këtyre gjykatave ishin të gjykonin ata që ishin më përgjegjës për organizimin e këtyre veprimeve si vrasje, përdhunim, torturë etj. Kjo gjykatë ka gjykuar 160 persona deri më tani. Dy vjet më vonë, Kombet e Bashkuara gjithashtu formuan Tribunalin Penal Ndërkombëtar të Ruandës, ku 93 persona u konsideruan fajtorë për shkelje të rënda të së Drejtës Ndërkombëtare Humanitare të angazhuar në Ruandë më 1994. Kjo gjykatë ishte gjykata e parë që ndonjëherë do të dorëzonte verdikt në lidhje me genocidin. Po ashtu, ishte gjykata e parë që definoi përdhunimin në të drejtën penale.
