The third novel, *That Hideous Strength*, develops the theme of nihilistic science threatening traditional human values, embodied in Arthurian legend. He held academic positions at both Oxford University (Magdalen College, 1925–1954) and Cambridge University (Magdalene College, 1954–1963). He is best known for his works of fiction, especially *The Screwtape Letters*, *The Chronicles of Narnia*, and *The Space Trilogy*, and for his non-fiction Christian apologetics, such as *Mere Christianity*, *Miracles*, and *The Problem of Pain*. Lewis and fellow novelist J. R. R. Tolkien were close friends. They both served on the English faculty at Oxford University, and were active in the informal Oxford literary group known as the Inklings. According to Lewis's memoir *Surprised by Joy*, he was baptised in the Church of Ireland, but fell away from his faith during adolescence. Lewis returned to Anglicanism at the age of 32, owing to the influence of Tolkien and other friends, and he became an "ordinary layman of the Church of England." Lewis's faith profoundly affected his work, and his wartime radio broadcasts on the subject of Christianity brought him wide acclaim. But trouble finds Cara when one of her eight remaining doppelgängers dies under mysterious circumstances, plunging her into a new world with an old secret. organization called NICE, which aims to control all human life. His wife, meanwhile, has prophetic dreams about a decapitated scientist, Alcasan. Alongside these novels, the author produces essays, Praise for, and compilations, and actively promotes the Cuban science fiction literary workshops, *Espiral* and *Espacio Abierto*. When he isn't translating, David Frye teaches Latin American culture and society at the University of Michigan. Translations include *First New Chronicle* and *Good Government* by Guaman Poma de Ayala (Peru, 1615); *The Mangy Parrot* by José Joaquín Fernández de Lizardi (Mexico, 1816), for which he received a National Endowment for the Arts Fellowship; *Writing across Cultures: Narrative Transculturation in Latin America* by Ángel Rama (Uruguay, 1982), and several Cuban and Spanish novels and poems. All together in one beautiful 3 volume set are C.S. Lewis' *Out Of The Silent Planet*, *Perelandra*, and *That Hideous Strength*. The omnibus edition of three classic and inspirational Clarke tales *ISLANDS IN THE SKY*, first published in 1954, sees Roy Malcolm winning a trip to the Inner Station, a space station rotating 500 miles from Earth. *THE SANDS OF MARS*, set in the 21st century, has a group of pioneers struggling to change the face of this inhospitable planet. In *EARTHLIGHT*, two centuries hence, man has colonised the planets and the inhabitants of the Moon owe no allegiance to any nation on Earth - or to Earth itself ... This omnibus edition of three of Arthur C. Clarke's early novels shows the author of *2001: A SPACE ODYSSEY* exploring space and time in adventurous and thoughtful ways.
